Cut out the pieces of cheese. Count out the amount you need and give **half** of the amount to each mouse.









Segment the sounds and then write the word on the line.



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Talk about 3 things you have enjoyed this week.




I liked playing outside because it's fun.

How many objects can you pick up?



Create your own masterpiece!




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Set up spaghetti and paint with a large piece of paper. Encourage your child to dip the spaghetti in the paint and create their own spaghetti painting picture! You could cook some spaghetti for different textures.

Halve the number of objects inside the box.

Write a list of five things in your house.




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Ask your child to write a list of five things in your house. You could encourage them to write words including certain sounds for practice! See guidance for Phase 3 sounds.

## Activity Outcomes

- Your child will learn how to identify different shapes whilst developing fine motor skills.

## Setting up

### What you will need

- Cotton wool balls.
- Glue.
- Shapes pre-drawn onto paper.

## Activity Guide

### Activity – Fluffy shapes

- Children are given a piece of paper with pre-drawn shapes on, for example, a triangle, square and circle.
- They name and describe the different shapes.
- Children then pull the cotton wool balls apart and stick it onto the inside of the shape using glue.
- The cotton wool must be placed carefully so that the outline of the shape is still visible, but the centre is 'fluffy'.
- Repeat the activity with the rest of the shapes.

### Questions you could ask your child during the activity

- Do any shapes have the same number of sides?
- Which shape has the most/least sides?
- Were any shapes easier to fill than others?

### Further Support and Ideas

- Children could try to draw their own shapes to then fill with cotton wool.
- Children could use other resource to fill their shapes, for example, glitter.
